Pride Week continued in full force with a series of events that reminded us just how powerful our voices can be, especially when they come together.

We started the day with an intimate and empowering writing workshop led by the incredible Uresa Ahmeti, under the theme "Mostep Back." It was a space where queer voices came alive, exploring themes of love, resistance, and identity. Participants shared raw, honest stories, and received guidance and encouragement to shape their words with intention and power. There were tears, there was laughter, and above all, there was an overwhelming sense of connection. Thank you, Uresa, for creating such a beautiful and brave space!

In the end of the afternoon, we joined the Prishtina Pride Talk with Yullnet Krasniqi, a journalist and tireless LIBIDI+ human rights advocate. ***
Yullnet's reflections on his personal journey, navigating media, activism, and identity, were deeply moving. He spoke with clarity, strength, and vulnerability about the victories, the struggles, and the importance of representation. We left feeling not just inspired, but re-energized to keep pushing forward.

And then came the grand finale. "Only Forward" Poetry Night. Under the stars and the rainbow flag, words broke free. Writers from the earlier workshop and other courageous people stood up and spoke their truth, with poetry that burned with passion, honesty, and courage. Every line was a reminder that our stories matter, and that silence is not an option.

"No step Back" was more than a slogan. It became a rhythm, a heartbeat, a collective promise:
No step Back. Only Forward.

What a day, from serious conversations about rights and resistance to a night of sequins, sass, and unstoppable sparkle!

Me began the day at the Annual Pride Conference at Lirius Hotel, gathering activists, policymakers, and community leaders under one roof to reflect on "The Ltate and the lights of LIB ID+Deople" and the shared responsibility in advancing these rights in a world that feels increasingly threatened by rising antigender movements. While the discussions highlighted crucial progress, they also made it clear that the fight is far from over Lignificant challenges remain, not only in shifting societal mindsets but also in transforming institutional structures that still perpetuate inequality and exclusion. From legal protections to inclusive public policies, much work lies ahead to ensure that rights are not only proclaimed but effectively upheld. The conference served as both a celebration of resilience and a call to action for continued advocacy at every level. We left feeling informed, a little overwhelmed and deeply committed to keep pushing forward.

But the right? Oh, the right was for the queens.

We danced, we screamed, we clapped till our hands hurt at the iconic Drag Show at Jeatri Oda, hosted by the fabulous Semi, with legendary performances by barbiel INA, Diva, Queen Maggy, Seri Bazi and the ever glorious Honey.
